REINS student population has grown steadily over the years to offer 8,000 lessons annually. We also attract over 1,000 Volunteers each year. We are currently recognized in the top 3% out of more than 850 PATH International Therapeutic Riding Programs.

Briefly describe your organization's history and accomplishments. :

REINS was founded in 1984 in a San Marcos backyard. A small handful of parents saw the benefits horseback riding was giving their students with disabilities and decided to make it available to as many people as possible. We moved to Fallbrook in 1992 and to our current location in 1997. In 1999 we were able to purchase our property and, thanks to a private donor, were able to completely pay off our mortgage in 2009. REINS student population has grown steadily over the years and while we once held lessons only a half day each week we now offer 8,000 lessons annually. We are currently recognized in the top 3% out of 850 PATH International Therapeutic Riding Programs and we have become a leading center in this field. REINS is proud to be celebrating our 36th Anniversary this year.

What are the current activities and/or programs offered by your organization?:

REINS provides therapy to nearly 200 students with a wide variety of diagnosis. Meaningful and purposeful activities are used with the client based on their interests and needs. During lessons, clients can work to refine fine motor, gross motor, bilateral coordination, oral motor and visual motor skills.

REINS wouldn't be possible without its amazing staff of weekly volunteers. REINS also offers a Healthy Volunteer Program. Volunteers make the program what it is by participating in various duties. Anywhere from leading horses during lessons to side walking with students to ensure safety, as well as grooming and tacking horses, and maintaining and improving the facility. These activities are benefiting both our disabled community and health and well-being of our community at large.

List and describe current collaborations with other organizations that enhance your ability to provide services through this program.:

We work locally with San Diego Regional Centers, Foundation for Senior Care, a variety of Disabled Adult Group Homes, Escondido Veterans Administration.

Fallbrook & Bonsall High Schools - We attend Community Fairs and share our volunteer opportunities with the youth.

Care-Rite Vocational Services- Care Rite and REINS collaborate on volunteer and fundraising opportunities for the disabled members of our community.

Fallbrook Blanket Project that services seniors and those feeling disenfranchised by donating handmade blankets to other non-profits to raise money for their programs.

CERT to coordinate CPR/First Aid Training for our staff and volunteers.

We also have ongoing relationship with nursing and P/T O/T Students at the local colleges.

Statement of Problem/Needs Assessment

Discuss the need for the proposed program or service within the District.:

REINS provides therapy on horseback to children and adults with disabilities. With over 800,000 people with disabilities in San Diego County alone, the need for therapy programs that improve the quality of life for the disabled community is imperative. Given that Fallbrook, Bonsall, DeLuz & Rainbow are nestled just far enough from the larger cities, it is important for our own community to have therapy opportunities for our residents. Therapeutic Horsemanship is a unique form of therapy and it can only be duplicated by another therapeutic riding facility. REINS is the only Therapeutic Riding Facility in Fallbrook, and the largest in San Diego County.

At REINS we are constantly working to increase the services we provide for our clients. Working with specialized, highly educated therapists, we are able to offer advanced physical, mental, and emotional therapy for our students. When working with a Physical Therapist we can focus on muscle tone, increasing strength, and improving balance. With the help of an Occupational Therapist, a student can translate skills they develop at REINS into the rest of the everyday life (such as fine motor or hand-eye coordination skills.) A Speech Language Pathologist can help clarify speech and develop better language skills, increase social skills, or make it possible to communicate with their horse, instructors, and peers.

Within our weekly resident students, over 70% of them have a speech impediment of some sort. We have had great success with being able to improve our students' speech abilities through our therapy on horseback. Since the diaphragm sits within the core of the body, strengthening the core muscles through our horseback therapy greatly strengthens our students speaking ability. This also helps immensely with their ability to eat solid foods. We have had many students be taken off their feeding tubes because of the strength they have gained through their lessons here.

While each of our REINS Instructors are certified through PATH International, we make it a priority to bring in specialists to make sure our students are getting the highest quality of therapeutic health services for their conditions. There is a need for this high level of educational consult our special needs students. Through our Consulting Therapy program we are able to provide this valuable therapy to our students who would otherwise be unable to afford these services.

We are fortunate that REINS is well known in our District and in our community. Our relationship doctors, therapists and programs for the disabled are well versed on the benefits of therapeutic riding and refer clients regularly. We have a small waiting list at all times as the needs of our community are so great.

Each potential student completes an 8 page intake Enrollment Form that is completed in part by caregivers, therapists and includes a physician's referral and release.

An intake evaluation is completed by our Program Director. Once it is determined that we have both availability and that REINS can benefit the student we schedule an initial ride.
